Friends,

When it comes to personality types, researchers and social scientists will tell us that there are a fascinating number of combinations that make up humans. As much as we are all different, there are some traits that can be generalized across humans – we have certain areas in which we respond upon a continuum.

Here is an example: we may be laid back or easily prone to anger. Some people are easily angered – some would say they even have a 'hair trigger' while other people are so unruffled by life that it seems even the worst offenses barely raise an eyebrow. Most of us fall somewhere in-between. There are primary traits of personality and there are a variety of secondary traits. The five primary traits are: agreeableness, extroversion, openness, conscientiousness, and neuroticism.

It's one of the secondary traits that caught my attention this month; that is, the trait of self-consciousness, where our self-esteem lives. In an over-simplified generalization, our self-esteem – how we feel about ourselves – is based in part upon external factors. But it is also a natural part of human personality types. Some humans are predisposed to having more positive thoughts about their self-worth and others are predisposed to having more negative thoughts about their self-worth.

But then on top of what our personal predisposition is toward personal self-worth or value, we have cultural and social influences. In part, how we think about ourselves is shaped by how others vocalize their perceptions of us. Do people tell us we are valuable? Do people tell us we are worthless?

Another part of our value comes from how we weigh our achievements/looks/possessions/abilities against what society tells us we should be like. Does our house match up with our neighbors' homes? Have we received awards or accolades? Do our children or grandchildren excel at sports or academics? Do our bodies look like those we see on TV, magazines, or online?

The stories of barren women in the Old Testament touch upon both internal self-worth and the perception of how others viewed barren women in the time of the ancient Israelites. Hannah's story of being unable to conceive, even though she had a loving husband, is a story of self-worth and value as much as it is a story about longing. She wanted a child to love. She also

wanted to be culturally accepted: having a child meant having a good social status where being barren meant she was less socially worthy than other women.

Personal value and self-worth are judged on different standards today than standards of 2,500 years ago. But the pain of low self-worth and of struggling with personal value has not changed.

I find deep comfort in Psalm 139 when considering personal value and worth. "O Lord, you have searched me and known me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up. You discern my thoughts from far away....you are acquainted with all my ways....you formed me and knit me together...I am fearfully and wonderfully made."

In all my imperfections, Psalm 139 offers a balm: God knows every single piece of me and thinks I'm of value. God made me and knew what I was going to be like and even in my imperfections, I am loved.

How incredible is that!?! However society judges me, however I judge myself, whatever metric I use to measure my value, God has already placed a value on me and it's a high value.

I'm not sure who first said it, but I've heard said several times before: "God made you, and God doesn't make junk." When I was younger, I thought this was pretty cheesy. Now, it brings me comfort because it reminds me of this psalm.

O Lord "I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made."

May we each remember that God has made us and loves us – imperfections and all!

Congregational Survey Feedback

<u>Thank you</u> to everyone who took the time to respond to the congregational surveys sent out in April. Here are the survey results. Two additional surveys are now available; we appreciate your feedback and input.

Approximately 1/3 of the membership of the congregation responded to the surveys.

Here are some of the results:

Worship and Participation Survey

- Of respondents, 2/3 attend worship weekly or several times per month. 10% alternate between inperson and online. 10% attend every other week.
- 1/3 of respondents visit the church office weekly and another 26% visit the office monthly. 12% visit the office less than once per year.
- 2/3 of respondents attend all, or most, events outside of worship including the church picnic, backpack blessing, and other activities
- 35% of respondents currently serve on more than one committee. In counter-balance, 26% have not served on a committee for at least three years
- Respondents value receiving cards, church mail, and the church newsletter
- Many worship attendees have assisted with worship in some way over the past two years, including liturgist, ushering for special events, participating in special worship services, assisting with communion, or offering a moment for mission.
- The most favored services are: Christmas Candlelight Service, Children's Christmas Program, Remembrance Service, Hanging of the Greens, and the Matins Services.
- The largest group of respondents was the 61-70 years age group at 35% followed by the 71-80 years age group at 32%.

Household and Family Survey

- 60% of respondents live with a spouse (two person household)
- 14% live alone, 11% live with a close family members
- Most participants (83%) attend the same church as those they live with
- Of respondents, 86% have living children; of those children, church attendance is mixed 23% attend church regularly, 43% attend some, and 33% do not attend a church
- Many respondents had grandchildren; of those grandchildren about half attend church
- 93% of respondents with children required they attend church when they were growing up
- Respondents consider "regular" church attendance to be weekly or two or more times per month
- When asked the preferred frequency of communion, 88% responded that they prefer a monthly communion schedule

Two Additional Congregational Surveys are now ready.
