#### Dear Friends,

In the Narthex this month is a fishing net complete with paper fishes on it. Below the net is a box with more paper fish and paper clips—where you, too, can take the time to add a fish. This is a prayer net. A place where for a few months this year, we will catch prayers. That is, it is a space where you can share prayers on your heart, whether big or small, generic or specific.

I remember a few years ago seeing a prayer for world peace on a prayer wall. It seemed so out of place among "Prayers for Bill" and "Prayers for my upcoming surgery". I think it felt out of place because

world peace seems too big, too insurmountable, too unrealistic. God already knows we want world peace, right? Isn't that a prayer that is so simplistic that we don't need to say it?

And yet, if we don't pray for world peace then who will?



I think we can say the same of other big things, too. Who will pray for the children of the world if we don't pray for them? Who will pray for leaders? Who will pray for those who are on the margins of society? Surely there are others out there already doing that praying.

Prayer is an interesting thing. It can be spoken out loud. It can be silent. It can be only in the heart of an individual, or it can be shared with friends, families, and even the entirety of the internet. It can be corporate (said together), or it can be tailored just for one. It raises the question: does God hear it better if the voices are amplified together? (A theological question for another day.)

One function of shared prayers is that it lets others know the burdens and elations of our own hearts. We are able to give others a glimpse into the joys and concerns that we carry from day to day. And it turns out, many of us do worry about world peace. And we worry about our crops, our neighbors, and we worry about ourselves. And ALL those prayers are important. When we share our burdens with others, they can join our prayers. And they can know us better.



### SHARING OUR SUNRISE JOYS AND CONCERNS

"So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given to you; search , and you will find; knock and the door will be opened unto you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened." (Luke 11: 9-10

When my children were growing up, we always grew a large garden at the back of our yard including the vacant lot below. And when I say "we" it was mostly Bill and 5 sometimes reluctant children. (especially when it came to pulling weeds!) We grew everything from radishes and carrots, corn and beans and other varieties of vegetables as well as ornamental gourds and corn.

But hands down the favorite of the kids were the peas. It was a favorite not only because they are fun to pick and eat right from the pod but because the "pea patch" allowed them some alone time with Dad. If Dad sensed that something might not be going right in their life - feelings hurt, friend problems, sibling rivalries -or- that he just wanted to tell them how proud he was of them, he would suggest that they might want to go to the garden to "pick peas". And it worked in reverse - often one of them would ask him if they could go pick peas, sometimes just to vent about their siblings!



Then too there were those times when they just sat quietly together on the ledge of the garden, Bill's arm around their shoulder, pea pods in hand, munching at the fresh peas in silence. Picking peas was the perfect opportunity for sensitive topics to be brought up all the while munching on peas. Of course the older they grew the less they wanted to head to the garden for conversation and peas, but it laid the foundation for them that Dad was always there to love them and listen if only figuratively sitting on the garden wall.

Reflecting on those days made me think of our relationship with God. How often we ignore that one-on-one time with him. As the scripture above says, we have only to ask and God will meet us at the garden wall. Through prayer he will listen to our frustrations and concerns as well as our blessings and joys. He will sit with us in silence during those times of grief and fear, extending his outstretched hand. He will celebrate those alleluia moments in our lives always listening, always loving, always there if we just knock.

We pray that the family of JoAnne Pomajevich is feeling God's touch as they mourn her loss. JoAnne was a longtime member of Sunrise, a faithful Deacon, a Bible study leader, always there with a hug and a smile. She touched many in our midst and I'm sure she's busy entertaining in heaven. Thanks, Bill, for teaching us how to pick peas.



## Friends,

We continued surveys of the congregation in June. The session, as we think toward the future, are looking at the answers from each survey. Thank you for your participation. Here are the insights from the survey on Christian Education.

Survey 3: Christian Education at Sunrise – 19 participants/respondents

- Sunrise members give <u>children's Christian education programs AND adult education programs</u> high importance. It is important to the membership that these programs be offered even though not everyone is interested in participating.
- For adult education, there is also high importance given to a <u>variety</u> of choices within the realm of adult education --- 31.6% ranking it 1 of 7 (1 is the highest), 21.1% ranking it 2 of 7. These answers pair with the question of <u>value on continued personal Christian learning</u>. Everyone surveyed ranked continued learning at neutral or higher, with the largest percentage ranking it 1 of 7 at 42.1%.
- Half of those surveyed (44%) have not participated in any adult education events over the past 2.5 years. 33% surveyed had attended at least one weekday video study and 28% had attended adult Sunday school.

\*Active church participants are also the most likely ones to also answer the surveys.

- Scripture list in the **newsletter** utilization: 21% use it regularly, 21% never use it, and 58% use it sometimes.
- Three of those surveyed have participated in a home/zoom study offered by Glacier Camp.
- Two-thirds use a **devotional study at home**; one third do not. The most commonly used home devotionals are: Upper Room (47%), These days, Our Daily Bread, and seasonal devotionals for Lent and Advent. One out of five use an **online study** or feed.

### Reading habits and preferences:

- Survey participants prefer these types of literature: non-fiction history, historical fiction, non-fiction biographies, general fiction, mystery, and self-improvement.
- When participating in a book study, participants are willing to put in time. Nearly 40% of participants are **willing to read** an hour a week for a book study. 11% are willing to read up to 40 minutes, and 22% are willing to read up to 20 minutes.
- The most important factors for book studies are: the time when it is held and that the topic is one of interest to the individual.
- Participants prefer a **4-6 week study** at 64.7%, **11.8%** prefer an ongoing study.
- For <u>Non-Reading options</u>, there was some interest in discussion of a TV series or film that was viewed together or in advance and then discussed. There was also interest in a video bible study at home or in person. There was no/limited interest in discussions via FB, Zoom, or through other media options.
- Interest in an outside/guest speaker: 67% said maybe, 28% said yes.
- Would people be more interested if they could pick the topic? The answer is: maybe at 56%, 22% said no, 22% said yes.
